Guild Supports SAFE Holiday Collection -- Our Guild is again supporting the holiday collection drive coordinated by The Consignment Shop in Flemington that donates their surplus wool garments to the Guild.

All proceeds from the Consignment Shop go to support "SAFE" (Stop Abuse for Everyone) in Hunterdon County. SAFE provides a series of programs and services for individuals and families touched by domestic violence and sexual assault.

This season, they desperately need sets of towels and have also requested PJs and slippers, which can go directly to the women at the shelter. Some were under the misconception that they no longer carried bolted wool.

Officer Nominations – Our process for nominating officers/chairs is beginning. The process is spelled out in Article V of our Guild's By-Laws, which is reproduced below.

“For the election of officers, a nominating committee shall be selected by the President in October, six (6) months in advance of the pending election of new officers. The nominating committee will identify prospective candidates and present the list in writing to the membership for consideration/election, no later than March

The following February, the nominating committee will confirm all candidates wishing to serve as officers of the guild.

In the event that there would be more than one candidate applying for any vacant

office, the membership will vote to decide on the successor.

Voting will occur during the April meeting, and officers will be elected by a simple majority of paid members present.

Newly elected slate of officers will be presented to the membership during the May meeting. Exiting officers will ensure a smooth transition by supplying necessary information to the new officers.

In addition to officers, there will be non-elected members holding positions of responsibility on a voluntary basis that will be selected by the President. The Sunshine Committee Chairman will mail cards or send items to those deemed necessary. The Public Relations person will advertise the necessary information concerning meetings and events. The Guild Historian will maintain records of historical interest.”

Instructors: The Magic of Masquerade with Cyndy Duade -- Let your imagination go out to play! Create your own magical mask to wear or be a wall display. Class includes a kit with the basic mask pattern, eye ribbon, and soft backing for the mask (\$15). You can embellish the basic pattern as drawn or transform it to your own creation. Combine wool, yarn, fabric, beads, feathers, and bling. Hook, sculpt, proddy, or embellish.

Class will cover mask design, choosing materials and embellishments, attaching special effects, backing application, finishing edges, and mounting for wall display. Lots of colorful wool, fabric, and embellishments will be available. Bring your imagination and creativity to this fun class and you can wear your mask home on Sunday!

Cyndy Duade lives in Springfield NH near lakes and mountains. She is an accredited McGown Teacher and attends Teachers' Workshop for continuing education. She has been teaching rug hooking for 12 years and enthusiastically embraces all styles of rug hooking.

Exploring Color & Hooking with Angela Foote -- Let the knowledge of color stimulate you to step outside your color box. Use your favorite color in a new way. Explore a variety of dyed wools, spots, dips, and sparkling marbled wools, swirling with color to enliven your rugs. Bring your love of color and hooking to class. Students may start a new project or spark up an existing project. All styles of hooking are welcome!

Students are contacted prior to class to discuss rug patterns, custom designs, color choices and any other hooking needs. Wools can be custom dyed for your project or as

an addition to your wool stash. Angela travels with a large assortment of beautiful dyed wools.

Angela Foote is a passionate creative rug hooker who loves to work with color. She is well known for her beautifully dyed wools and unique wool garments. Whether over the dye pot, teaching classes, lecturing on color, or creating in her studio, Angela's 30 years of experience is evident in her works of art. She is a certified McGown teacher, member of ATHA and enjoys hooking in both fine shading and primitive styles. She has regular classes in her studio and teaches at guild meetings and workshops across New England. FABRICFOOTE is her hooking and dyeing business.

In addition to a regular hook-in, we will have two mini lectures, a rug exhibit and a clinic where people can get advice/suggestions on their rug hooking projects. A beginners' workshop will also be offered by Juliana Kapusta and Patty Mahaffey. We are planning

for about 50 people in addition to the beginners' workshop. Those who plan to attend are encouraged to register early.

The museum exhibits that will be on display make the Mennonite Heritage Center a special site for our hook-in. Their exhibit of Pennsylvania German fraktur is quite extraordinary and an ideal location for our exhibit of rugs hooked by participants. In addition, there will be a special display entitled "*Milestones: Observances in Mennonite Family and Church Life*" as well as their permanent exhibit on Mennonite history.

HCRAG Annual Summer Camp (August 13 -17, 2012) --Our Guild's 16th annual rug hooking camp will be held from August 13, 2012 through August 17, 2012 at the ESC School outside of Lambertville, NJ. In keeping with our tradition, nationally recognized instructors – Arline Bechtoldt, Jeanne Benjamin and Lucille Festa – will provide a stimulating, educational and fun camp experience. Gail Ferdinando, Judy Quintman and Debbie Walsh will again run camp in 2012.

Guild dues need to be paid by the end of this month in order to be eligible for the reduced member fee.

Our Teachers –

Jeanne Benjamin: Jeanne started hooking in 1971 and became McGown certified in 1979. She owns New Earth Designs, a pattern business of diverse designs, and also has a dyed wool mail order business. Jeanne has a loyal following and is known for her beautiful dyeing and color planning, often dyeing 50 yards or more of wool weekly.

Jeanne stresses good pre-camp communication and advance planning to maximize students' class time. She gives instructions in small increments which enables her to get around the classroom quickly. Class time includes question and answer periods so everyone can participate and learn, not only from individual instruction, but from group time as well.

Jeanne expects you to relax, keep an open mind, and enjoy this creative time! Jeanne often teaches an open class (she enjoys a large class with diversity) but her specialties are Orientals, making a primitive design look antique, folk art, and pictorials.

Arline Bechtoldt: Arline is an accredited teacher who enjoys teaching a student driven class. She recently gave a talk at the Alice Beatty Chapter of ATHA and showed her rugs which ranged from beautifully fine shaded faces, flowers, and antique designs, to whimsical and primitive motifs.

Before camp Arline discusses with each student their particular needs for their rug. She will help with color planning and can provide custom dyed wool as

needed and/or work with wool already on hand. She will also bring a supply of wool to class.

During class time Arline will discuss technique, color planning, and finishing, and as the day is winding down, creative stitches, dyeing techniques, labeling, and any other topics of interest. Arline plans to ensure that your rug becomes the masterpiece you envision!

Lucille Festa: Lucille is a collector of antiques and a history buff especially interested in the American Civil War era and women's history. She started her business, American Country Rugs, about seven years ago and sell patterns (including her "door people") via her website.

She specializes in primitive style rugs and often incorporates old antique colors, textures, and wide cut wools as well as folk art images into her rugs. Lucille loves colors that evoke a feeling of antiquity and enjoys creating rugs with an aged look. She brings plenty of wool plaids, checks, tweeds, and herringbones to her classes. She will help you to color plan and hook a warm, antique style rug that will be passed down through the generations.

Registration/Instructional Fees –The fee for camp is \$175 for Guild members who have paid their dues by December 31, 2011. For all others, the fee is \$250. A non-refundable deposit of \$25 is required to make a reservation for camp. The balance of the fee is due by May 30, 2012. For all reservations received after May 30th, the camp fee must be paid in full at the time of registration. Refund Policy –For cancellations received on or before June 10, 2012, the camp fee less the \$25 non-refundable deposit will be made. For cancellations received after June 10th, no refunds will be made unless the camp vacancy is filled and paid in full.

Meet Our Member – Jacqueline Lee -- Jacqueline Lee lives on Cape Cod all year round and learned about our Guild from an article in Rug Hooking Magazine. She realized that she could be part of the Guild and combine visits to her sister who lives in Branchburg, NJ with Guild events. She became a member shortly thereafter and has been a regular participant at our January retreat, summer camp and our spring workshops. “I am thrilled to be a member of the Hunterdon Guild”, she notes. Jackie is also a member of the Cranberry Rug Hooking Chapter of ATHA. She is winding up her second (and final!) term as Treasurer, and hopes to become part of a new committee to promote education and outreach. She will also replace the current librarian for their guild. “No one in my family hooks and I need to be with people with similar interests. They spark my creativity and my technique gets better.”

“I am crazy about textiles. It is something I learned from my mother early on” Jackie notes. Over the years she has done embroidery, crewel and needlepoint before becoming enthralled by rug hooking. Her introduction to rug hooking took place in 2005 while shopping at an outlet in Maine where she found a Claire Murray kit. The kit had instructions for the “Nantucket style” of hooking with yarn which is the style for which Claire Murray is known.

Jackie was living in Maryland at the time and soon learned of Roz Logsdon who had her studio in Laurel, Maryland. Jackie started to attend Roz' classes on a regular basis. “I gave up on hooking with yarn as soon as I saw what could be accomplished with wool strips” Jackie recalls. There was something about working with wool and the size of projects that really appealed to her. Rugs are not dainty. She likes working with wool strips instead of thread or yarn. “Rug hooking affords more than small needlepoint projects. It's a tactile thing and endlessly creative” notes Jackie. She has found that her rug hooking sparks creativity and “provides entry into the creative process.”

Roz Logsdon, who is a regular instructor at Green Mountain Rug Hooking Guild's annual "Hooked in the Mountains" workshops mentioned the gathering to Jackie. She decided to go. "I plunged into the wonderful world of rug hooking. I bought scissors, hooks, and the works!" Jackie beams. A class with Patsy Becker came next. It turned out to be the last class Patsy taught because of her declining health.

Long before she began to hook rugs, Jackie had kept scraps of fabric, pictures, magazine photos, etc., with colors or patterns which piqued her interest. Fascinated by them, she was vexed by what to do with them, and occasionally, would chastise herself for keeping the assortment. On several occasions, she nearly pitched the lot. Later she learned their purpose was to serve as artistic inspiration, being the muse which sparked the creative impulse into being. One of these items was a cocktail-sized paper napkin composed solely of soft blues and greens. She employed these colors exclusively in her first rug, Patsy Becker's pattern Little Crewel. Jackie continues to find inspiration from artworks, fabric, prints, and now, of course, rugs by others. Karen Kahle's particular approach to primitive style has been a major influence. "Karen's style spoke to me in an amazing way. Her approach to creating background by mingling short, 5-7 loop strips made up of all the values of a single color, from palest to darkest, was a revelation." She utilized this technique also in that first rug, Little Crewel, which is one of her rugs on our website.

Jackie makes it a practice to regularly attend workshops and camps. She has had the opportunity to work with many of the most respected instructors in the northeast and has learned from each one. Her teachers have included Susan Feller, Angela Foote, Kathleen Herbert, Rae Harrell, Jayne Hester, Norma McElhenny, Sibyl Osicka, Jule Marie Smith, and Diane Stoffel. Rae Harrell was Jackie's instructor at her first HCRAAG camp. "Rae gave me permission to throw away the rules" Jackie notes. "I learned never to look back and to follow if being called in a certain direction." She has been fortunate recently to be included in twice yearly workshops (April and October) on Cape Cod featuring Angela Foote, a New Hampshire instructor whose incredibly colored wools are amazing.

Jackie hooks with #8 and #8.5 cuts in the primitive style. She wants to try other things with color, perhaps something abstract. Jackie works primarily with her own patterns but will buy patterns designed by others if she "falls for it". Her ideas for patterns come from various sources. She once received a card with a lattice work design that appealed to her. The lattice work inspired a perfect border for one of her rugs. "Color is at the forefront of my design process. I am color driven." Jackie notes. She will see color in a piece of wool and looks for a way to use it in a rug. "I am always working on my technique and see that I am getting better with more consistent loops. I am at a point where I can now use different heights of loops intelligently to create the results I want." she observes. Jackie is not attracted to proddy or other embellishments.

New and recycled wool are used in Jackie's rugs. She finds old blankets from thrift shops to be ideal for backgrounds. However, she also buys new wool from her teachers and from vendors at the camps she attends.

Dyeing her own wool has a lot of appeal but she does not always have time to get the dye pots out, so Jackie does use wool dyed by others. Karen Kahle's *Little Dye Book* is a favorite source for dye formulas.

Hooking at home has been a challenge for Jackie because other things always seem to get in the way. She recently decided to now make time for her hooking and is hooking a lot more. She hooks mostly in the evenings but will also do it in the mornings. Jackie has come to the

realization that we do not know how much time we have left, so we need to have priorities such as getting more hooking done.

Cooking is another one of Jackie's passions. She particularly enjoys creating recipes which are both delicious and healthy. For example, she makes her own applesauce and creatively adds other fruits with the apples. The same is true with her soups. She will make a big pot of soup with lots of veggies that will last a week or more.

Jackie has always loved books and reading, which lead to her professional career as a librarian. Recipe – Here is a Pennsylvania Dutch recipe for Chicken Pot Pie that was shared by the ATHA Biennial Hospitality Committee.

Ingredients:

3 lb whole chicken	2 cans chicken broth
Water to cover chicken	3-4 celery stalks
5 carrots	1 large onion
1 Tbsp parsley	5 potatoes
6 ears fresh corn (or frozen corn)	

Place chicken, chicken broth, and water to cover chicken into a pot
Dice the celery, carrots, and large onion – add to pot
Salt and pepper to taste
Add a tablespoon of parsley
Cook chicken for approximately an hour
Remove chicken from pot and let cool
Pull the meat off the bones and breast – set aside
Peel and quarter five potatoes – add to the broth

Pot Pie Dough Ingredients:

2 cups of flour
Enough broth to form dough ball (or use Bot Boi Pennsylvania Dutch Squares)
1 egg

Roll out dough on a floured board or counter top and cut into squares. (The dough will have particles of celery, parsley, onions and carrots in it that makes for good tasting.)
Drop the dough squares into the boiling broth and cook for about 30 minutes or until the dough is thoroughly cooked through.

This home made dough will be thicker than store bought Bot Boi, but the early Pennsylvania Dutch families loved it this way.
