**Instructors: The Magic of Masquerade with Cyndy Duade** -- Let your imagination go out to play! Create your own magical mask to wear or be a wall display. Class includes a kit with the basic mask pattern, eye ribbon, and soft backing for the mask (\$15). You can embellish the basic pattern as drawn or transform it to your own creation. Combine wool, yarn, fabric, beads, feathers, and bling. Hook, sculpt, proddy, or embellish.

Class will cover mask design, choosing materials and embellishments, attaching special effects, backing application, finishing edges, and mounting for wall display. Lots of colorful wool, fabric, and embellishments will be available. Bring your imagination and creativity to this fun class and you can wear your mask home on Sunday!

Cyndy Duade lives in Springfield NH near lakes and mountains. She is an accredited McGown Teacher and attends Teachers' Workshop for continuing education. She has been teaching rug hooking for 12 years and enthusiastically embraces all styles of rug hooking.

Exploring Color & Hooking with Angela Foote -- Let the knowledge of color stimulate you to step outside your color box. Use your favorite color in a new way. Explore a variety of dyed wools, spots, dips, and sparkling marbled wools, swirling with color to enliven your rugs. Bring your love of color and hooking to class. Students may start a new project or spark up an existing project. All styles of hooking are welcome!

Students are contacted prior to class to discuss rug patterns, custom designs, color choices and any other hooking needs. Wools can be custom dyed for your project or as an addition to your wool stash. Angela travels with a large assortment of beautiful dyed wools.

Angela Foote is a passionate creative rug hooker who loves to work with color. She is well known for her beautifully dyed wools and unique wool garments. Whether over the dye pot, teaching classes, lecturing on color, or creating in her studio, Angela's 30 years of experience is evident in her works of art. She is a certified McGown teacher, member of ATHA and enjoys hooking in both fine shading and primitive styles. She has regular classes in her studio and teaches at guild meetings and workshops across New England. FABRICFOOTE is her hooking and dyeing business.

**Plans for Camp 2012 Underway** --Our Guild's 16<sup>th</sup> annual rug hooking camp will be held from August 13, 2012 through August 17, 2012 at the ESC School outside of Lambertville, NJ. In keeping with our tradition, nationally recognized instructors – Arline Bechtoldt, Jeanne Benjamin and Lucille Festa – will provide a stimulating, educational and fun camp experience. Our great team of camp directors from this year – Gail Ferdinando, Judy Quintman and Debbie Walsh – will again run camp in 2012.

**Our Teachers –**

**Jeanne Benjamin:** Jeanne started hooking in 1971 and became McGown certified in 1979. She owns New Earth Designs, a pattern business of diverse designs, and also has a dyed wool mail order business. Jeanne has a loyal following and is known for her beautiful dyeing and color planning, often dyeing 50 yards or more of wool weekly.

Jeanne stresses good pre-camp communication and advance planning to maximize students' class time. She gives instructions in small increments which enables her to get around the classroom quickly. Class time includes question and answer periods so everyone can participate and learn, not only from individual instruction, but from group time as well.

Jeanne expects you to relax, keep an open mind, and enjoy this creative time! Jeanne often teaches an open class (she enjoys a large class with diversity) but her specialties are Orientals, making a primitive design look antique, folk art, and pictorials.

**Arline Bechtoldt:** Arline is an accredited teacher who enjoys teaching a student driven class. She recently gave a talk at the Alice Beatty Chapter of ATHA and showed her rugs which ranged from beautifully fine shaded faces, flowers, and antique designs, to whimsical and primitive motifs.

Before camp Arline discusses with each student their particular needs for their rug. She will help with color planning and can provide custom dyed wool as needed and/or work with wool already on hand. She will also bring a supply of wool to class.

During class time Arline will discuss technique, color planning, and finishing, and as the day is winding down, creative stitches, dyeing techniques, labeling, and any other topics of interest. Arline plans to ensure that your rug becomes the masterpiece you envision!

Lucille Festa: Lucille is a collector of antiques and a history buff especially interested in the American Civil War era and women's history. She started her business, American Country Rugs, about seven years ago and sell patterns (including her "door people") via her website.

She specializes in primitive style rugs and often incorporates old antique colors, textures, and wide cut wools as well as folk art images into her rugs. Lucille loves colors that evoke a feeling of antiquity and enjoys creating rugs with an aged look. She brings plenty of wool plaids, checks, tweeds, and herringbones to her classes. She will help you to color plan and hook a warm, antique style rug that will be passed down through the generations.

**Registration/Instructional Fees** –The fee for camp is \$175 for Guild members who have paid their dues by December 31, 2011. For all others, the fee is \$250. A non-refundable deposit of \$25 is required to make a reservation for camp. The balance of the fee is due by May 30, 2012. For all reservations received after May 30th, the camp fee must be paid in full at the time of registration. **Refund Policy** –For cancellations received on or before June 10, 2012, the camp fee less the \$25 non-refundable deposit will be made. For cancellations received after June 10th, no refunds will be made unless the camp vacancy is filled and paid in full.

**Another Busy Month for HCRAAG Demonstrators** – Joanne McIlmurray represented the Guild at the Apple Butter Frolic sponsored by the Mennonite Heritage Center. This year the Frolic was held on the Heritage Center grounds in Harleysville, PA on Saturday October 1, 2011. It was not the most pleasant day weather wise but there was a big turnout. In addition to rug hooking, rug braiding, tape making, spinning and flax processing were demonstrated. Many also wanted to share stories of their grandmothers or relatives hooking or wanting to know where to get an old rug fixed.

**Meet Our Member -- Eleanor Dunker** – When Eleanor was a young child, she remembers watching her mother hook rugs. Her mother and a friend had learned to hook from a neighbor in town. Eleanor did not realize what an impact this had on her until she became an adult. Her mother had stopped hooking when Eleanor was in high school because her father had passed away and her mother needed to get a job outside of the home. She never hooked another rug after that.

Her mother gave rugs for special events like a marriage or milestone birthday. Since Eleanor was the youngest child by 15 years, she was the only one in her family who did not receive one of her mother's rugs. The memories of her sitting with a rug wrapped around her lap every evening started to invade Eleanor's thoughts. She also remembers her mother going out with her best friend to search for wool at places like rummage sales. At one auction, she bought a huge amount of wool yarn that she incorporated in many of her rugs.

Finally, around 2004, while visiting her daughter in college in Vermont, Eleanor stumbled on the Green Mountain Rug Hooking Guild as they were setting up their Hooked in the Mountains exhibit in the Shelburne Museum Round Barn. They were not open to the public yet, but they kindly let her in since she was heading back to NJ. It was then that Eleanor decided that she was going to learn how to hook and create one of those rugs that she admired that day. Eleanor could not believe the variety of styles and topics that she saw and the amazing talent on display. Eleanor recalls that "That some of the rugs I saw made you laugh, other's told a story of a personal journey, and others were just beautiful. All called to me."8:05:59 PM

However, finding people back home who hooked proved to be harder than she expected. Eleanor was unable to locate local instructors or other rug hookers. Today, the internet lets you connect easily. Quite by accident, she was talking with Sue Menges and June Madden at her women's investment club when she discovered that they were HOOKERS. They took her under their wings and invited Eleanor to come to the Highlands with them. That was her first mini camp and she has been "hooked" ever since. June and Sue were part of a small group of women that met once a month to hook, but they did not meet during the summer at that time. "I then found someone named Gail Dufresne and she lived a drivable distance from my home." Eleanor recalls. She called and Gail invited Eleanor to attend her Saturday class. "June, Sue and Gail were my first three mentors." notes Eleanor.8:05:59 PM

Hooking primitive style rugs fits in perfectly with Eleanor's love for history, antiques and the 1761 house that she and her husband, Skip, have been restoring for most of their married life. "The primitive rug goes quite well with my decorating. However, the brighter colors are calling--- thanks, Patty Mahaffey! Also, I do love some of the finely shaded rugs. I guess I will be exploring many styles.??I??can??see??that??I??will??be??expanding??my??style??of??hooking??in??the??future.??" says Eleanor.

8:05:59 PM After a difficult time initially locating rug hooking resources, Eleanor soon learned of the stimulating camps and schools available within driving distance. "I love Rugs by the Sea camp with Norma and Linda. You can park your car and not move it all week. The teachers are fabulous and it is so much fun to be around so many talented people." she observes. She has also attended "One Rug Two Rugs" by Carrie Martin in New Orleans, Barbara Carroll's camp at the Wooley Fox, and twice with Stephanie Krauss at her Green Mountain Camp in Vermont.

With so many skilled wool dyers producing beautiful dyed wool that is available locally and at workshops, Eleanor has not felt compelled to seriously take up wool dyeing. She has attended a few mini dye workshops and found that the one Diane Stoffel incorporated into her workshop this past August at our camp was very informative. "So far I have not really done any dyeing but I hope that changes soon. I will probably start with over-dyeing textures." she notes.

When Eleanor finds a pattern that she loves, she will buy it. She did design a pattern of her house, but it took three years to "get all the bugs out of it". That experience helped her appreciate the time involved in designing a rug pattern; she currently prefers to hook commercially available patterns.

Eleanor tries to hook in the evening while watching TV, but finds that daily demands can make that difficult. She has started a practice that her mother-in-law used when working on her many quilts. "It involves getting up an hour earlier, getting that cup of coffee and sitting down before the rest of the day's activities took over and just hooking for an hour. It is working and I am finally finishing some old projects."

Our Guild came to Eleanor's attention by members she met at Gail Dufresne's studio and who were talking about our camp. "Our Guild offers some great camps. It is amazing what HCRAAG accomplishes and the teacher's they bring in. Guild members are so friendly and welcoming. I feel privileged to be a part it." Eleanor is also a member of the Goat Hill Rug Hooking Guild and the Pinelands Guild that is growing in numbers and meets closer to her home.

Eleanor has always liked to do handcrafts. At various times over the years, she has done tole painting, quilting, knitting and counted cross stitch. There was something different with rug hooking. "Hooking really fits with my love of history and is something I will do the rest of my life." she observes. Her rugs decorate the floors of her historic house with the special ones displayed on the walls.

After earning a Master Degree in Education as a Reading Specialist, Eleanor devoted 35 years teaching elementary school. She went on to teach "how to teach reading" for two years at the Georgian Court College in Toms River, NJ. Eleanor and Skip live in Bordentown, NJ. Skip has spent his professional life in the aviation industry. ## **Hooking Information & Techniques**

**From Nina's Notebook** – I am one of the lucky people who celebrates two Thanksgivings; one in Canada and one in the US. Canadian Thanksgiving is the same weekend as the Columbus Day holiday in the US. For both countries it is a time of homecoming and gathering around the dining table filled with turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie; all the traditional foods of the holiday. Every year I am filled with thanks that I have the opportunity to celebrate in two countries.

On Deanne Fitzpatrick's blog [www.hookingrugs.com](http://www.hookingrugs.com) I found two beautiful examples of hooked pieces that simply said thanks. One was filled with hit or miss circles surrounding the word Thanks which was outlined with one color and hooked in another on neutral background. The second piece showed a woman in a flowered dress with the word Thanks written underneath in a wide border. Both these examples set my mind whirling on all the possibilities for a Thanks rug. What about a long table runner with the word thanks written several times and a twisting vine or padula flowered wide border with a spot dyed background? Pumpkins, leaves in fall colors, corn stalks and barns, colorful turkeys with their tails unfolded are also possibilities to include in a thanks mat.

Think of all the people, events, and places that you are thankful for and then choose one for a special thanks mat. Each time you see the mat it will remind you that there are many things for which to be thankful.

For me, I am especially thankful for the members of HCRAAG and their devotion to the art of rug hooking.

**Tips from Heloise** – During the ATHA Biennial in Lancaster, Heloise spoke with a rug hooker who used the linings from old skirts to dye wool. Heloise learned that there is dye in the linings that can be leached out. It is a simple process:

- Roll a piece of dry wool with the skirt lining forming a “jelly roll” and tie it with a strip of wool.
- Place the jelly roll(s) in 3-4 inches of cold water in the die pot.
- Add a slug of laundry detergent
- Bring the water to a slow simmer and let simmer for about 30 minutes. You will see the color leach out into the water.
- Add ½ cup of white vinegar
- Simmer until the dye is absorbed by the wool (normally takes 5–20 minutes).
- Turn off the heat and allow the water to cool
- Rinse wool in warm water, spin dry and put in dryer

The wool will have an interesting mottled look. Sometimes the dyed wool will be a different color than the lining. In any event, using skirt linings is an inexpensive way to get beautiful dyed wool.

**Recipe** -- Therese Shick not only produces fabulous hooked rugs (Did you see her Giraffe and Orangutan rugs at the last meeting? Wow!) but bakes wonderful treats for our meetings. By popular demand she has provided the recipe for her Jewish Coffee Cake that she brought to the October meeting. Therese obtained the recipe from her good quilting friend Liz.

Ingredients:

- 2 sticks butter, softened
- 3 cups sifted flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 16 oz. sour cream
- 2 t. baking soda
- 2 t. baking powder
- 2 t. vanilla
- 4 eggs

Put all dry ingredients in mixer bowl. Add softened butter and mix to combine. Then add sour cream, vanilla and eggs, beating after each. Beat for 2 minutes.

Topping:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

- 2 t. cinnamon

Mix the topping together. Add about ½ of the topping to the batter (then sprinkle the rest on top). Grease and flour baking pan(s). The original recipe calls for one 11 x 14 pan. I used two 8 x 11 pans. This way I can freeze one if I want to. Or you could just cut the recipe in half and make one. It makes a lot!

Bake at 350° for 45-55 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean.
